## Electronic Reserves in the NCSU Libraries

**T**he NCSU Libraries' Electronic Reserve Service offers instructors the opportunity to make materials available to their students on the World Wide Web. The documents may be accessed by course number or instructor name via the electronic-reserve Web page at <http://www.lib.ncsu.edu/rbr/>.

### FACTS ABOUT ELECTRONIC RESERVES

- Materials that can be placed on electronic reserves include journal articles, book chapters, instructors' class notes, homework, and past exams. When provided on paper, these materials are scanned and converted to .pdf format. In addition, many documents already in digital format are welcome, such as images or charts created by the instructor.
- Electronic-reserve materials may be requested via the four branch libraries as well as the D. H. Hill Library: Design, Natural Resources, Textiles, and Veterinary Medical libraries.
- Materials for electronic reserves are accepted throughout the year. Items are processed in the order they are received. Every attempt is made to process material within three to four days.

### COPYRIGHT POLICY

- The Electronic Reserve Service provides course readings in a manner that respects fair use rights, the rights of copyright holders, and current copyright law. Full citations are required for all

material. The Libraries' Copyright Policy on Reserves is on the Web at:

### CHANGES TO ELECTRONIC RESERVES

- The electronic-reserve Web page has a new design for fall 2000. Electronic-reserve materials are now searchable by either course name or instructor name.
- Search results now include all of the reserve materials for the course or instructor—both the electronic documents and the print materials available in the Reserve Room or the branch library.
- Electronic-reserve documents may be opened with the "full text online" link on the results page.
- Electronic-reserve materials may be accessed in the Libraries' online catalog by searching for the document by title or author. The document is opened with the "retrieve this item" link in the catalog.

### SPECIAL NOTE TO INSTRUCTORS

- The complete **citation** and the **course name and section number** must be provided for all materials sent to the Reserve Room for both traditional and electronic reserves.
- Instructors may request the temporary or permanent removal of electronic-reserve materials by contacting the Reserve Room at [reserves@ncsu.edu](mailto:reserves@ncsu.edu) or phoning ext. 5-2597.

**B**ooks recently acquired by the D. H. Hill Library are displayed weekly near the entrance to the library. Library users are encouraged to view them on a regular basis.

In the past, the library has asked interested users to place requests to borrow these items *after* they were removed from the new books display. Now, for user convenience, these books may be checked out while still on display.

In addition, library users with specific subject areas of interest may receive electronic-mail notification when new materials on those subjects become available. This notification is made through the "Current Awareness Manager" feature of MyLibrary@NCState, a customized information service provided by the NCSU Libraries. ## Fall 2000 Scholarly Communication Colloquium

**T**he NCSU Libraries, NC State's Office of the Provost, and the Scholarly Communication Subcommittee of the University Library Committee are sponsoring a Scholarly Communication Colloquium on October 5, 2000, from 9:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. at the McKimmon Center. The program is entitled, "Reinventing the Knowledge Wheel: Leading the Revolution in the Ownership and Management of Scholarship."

Morning sessions will consider alternatives to traditional print publishing and will feature three outstanding innovators in this area: **James G. Neal** (Dean, University Libraries, Johns Hopkins University) speaking on the Scholarly Publishing and Academic Resources Coalition (SPARC); **Michael L. Rosenzweig** (University of Arizona), editor-in-chief of *Evolutionary Ecology Research*, a print and electronic publication; and **Richard Lucier** (University Librarian and Executive Director, California Digital Library).

Afternoon sessions will explore copyright ownership issues in higher education. They will be led by two articulate and knowledgeable speakers: **David Shulenburg** (Provost, University of Kansas) speaking on the AAU Intellectual Property Task Force report and **Dan L. Burk** (Professor of Law, University of Minnesota) addressing ownership of electronic course materials in higher education.

The colloquium will end with two consecutive panel discussions. The first panel, moderated by **Provost Kermit L. Hall**, will discuss specific copyright ownership issues in an academic setting. Panelists are **Laura Gasaway** (Director, Law Library, UNC-Chapel Hill), **David A. Danehower** (Associate Professor, Crop Science, NCSU), **Benjamin Speller** (Dean, North Carolina Central Library School), **Risa Palm** (Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, UNC-Chapel Hill), and **Peggy E. Hoon** (Scholarly Communication Librarian, NCSU Libraries).

Speakers for the second panel are **Provost Hall**, **Gretchen Bataille** (Vice President, Academic Affairs, UNC General Administration), and a representative from Duke University's Office of the Provost. They will discuss the new UNC system and Duke University intellectual property policy recommendations, their development, and underlying principles.

## Design Library Renovations

**T**hroughout the summer, the Design Library has undergone extensive renovations according to plans developed by Cannon Architects of Raleigh. The renovations have created a library that is now ADA-compliant and more accessible to all library users. The interior space has been substantially improved with new carpeting, new furniture for patrons and staff, and a completely redesigned area for the slide collection. The architects have sensitively highlighted the unique features of the interior space, which was once the reading room of NC State's former main library in historic Brooks Hall.

Some work remains to be done. A consequence of the renovations was the elimination of some shelving space, and a considerable number of library materials have been transferred to the D. H. Hill Library. The shifting and reallocation of books between these two facilities will require much attention in coming weeks. In the near future, a new circulation desk will be installed. Eventually, the Design Library will have new lighting fixtures and window treatments added. Returning students have already been thrilled to see "their space" get such a makeover. The library will be fully functioning and ready for the start of fall classes. An open house is being planned for later in the semester.

**Nomination Criteria:**

- ❖ Works actively and effectively to support the Libraries,
- ❖ Promotes the role of the Libraries as an essential component of the university's mission,
- ❖ Works in partnership with library faculty and staff in teaching, research, and/or extension activities,
- ❖ Promotes expanded access to information resources.

**The Award Includes:**

- ❖ Use of a faculty study in the D. H. Hill Library for one year,
- ❖ A \$100 photocopy card,
- ❖ Honorary life membership in the Friends of the Library,
- ❖ Name engraved on an NCSU Libraries Faculty Award plaque,
- ❖ A special recognition certificate.
