semester. Deploying WolfCopiers in D. H. Hill will have the advantage for students and faculty of eliminating the need to carry more than one type of copy card. ♦

Renovation of the D. H. Hill Library's East Wing Begins

Phase I of the NCSU Libraries' Master Plan to expand and enhance its physical space for the benefit of students and faculty has begun. Those who have visited the D. H. Hill Library recently have noticed that the entrance to the first floor of the East Wing is closed off with plywood. Over the next eighteen months, renovations will include upgrading the building's infrastructure, constructing a Special Collections Re-

search Center, and creating a technology-enriched Learning Commons. For the most part, students and faculty should experience minimal interruptions in library services, although there will be a temporary reduction in study space and a circuitous route to the third floor of the East Wing.
